## **Critique & Comment**

The women of Stormhill have had a long history with the Afghan Hound Club of America both as breeder/exhibitors and judges. Virginia Withington, my mother, had the honor of judging the National when it was held at the Statler Hilton in New York City in 1971 and 1981. I had the honor of judging bitches and Intersex at the National in Phoenix in 1986 and dogs and Intersex this year in Chicago.

You couldn't have asked for a more perfect venue to showcase our breed. I felt there wasn't a dog that wasn't shown to his best advantage in this ring.

I have always felt that Afghans look their best when shown outdoors in a large grassy ring versus shown indoors on carpeting. This year's National was very reminiscent of the San Diego National with the beautiful large grassy ring that was located on the back side of the hotel overlooking beautiful Lake Michigan.

The dog classes were judged on Wednesday. I had an entry of 82 class dogs. There were some very nice dogs to choose from. Some of the classes were steeped in quality while others were not. It was a pleasure to award Winners Dog to the beautiful brindle domino XENOS JOSELITO from the Open Dog class. He is a beautifully balanced dog both standing and moving. Nice arch of neck, good topline, beautiful tail, in excellent condition and shown to perfection by his handler. Reserve Winners Dog was between the 12-18 month brindle dog ETRIGAN THE PRETENDER and the Bred by Exhibitor and Best Bred by in Show OBIWAN TRUE BLUE. I awarded reserve to the 12-18 dog. He is a raw talent that gives you moments of brilliance. He is very houndy with tremendous reach and drive. I think he is one to watch in the future. The Bred by dog is a very handsome upstanding masculine dog with good reach and drive as well. I also awarded him Best Bred by Exhibitor in show.

Friday, Helen Stein and I began the day helping pass out the ribbons in both the Parade of Rescue and the

Parade of Veterans classes. Hearing the stories of each and every rescue dogs is such an emotional experience. It was quite a sight seeing both the rescue dogs and the veterans being paraded around the ring so proudly with their owners/handlers. Special thanks to Darlyn and Stephen Pfeiffer for showing CH. STORMHILL'S KISMET OF CALAIS (Kissy) in the Veterans Class.

At noon, 82 beautiful specials entered the ring for Best of Breed judging. It was quite a sight when they all convened in the ring for a group photo. I had each dog come in individually so that I could get a good look at each of them by themselves while I checked each one off in my book. I then divided them into groups of 10. From each group I would select the dogs that I wanted to keep in for further consideration. After judging all the doas, the doas selected from the first cut came back in and then I made my final cut of the day from which the winners would ultimately be selected. There were many dogs that had to go out in the first and second cuts that would normally have stayed until the end at most shows.

When each of the dogs first came in individually my eventual Best of Breed winner, CH, XANDALI ISABEAU OF BOANNE, made such an impact on me that I remember telling myself that it was hers to lose. She never faltered. She is a timeless beauty who put on the performance of a lifetime. She has a lovely head, with a beautiful dark eye and wonderful chiseling. She has a strong arched neck, good angulation both front and rear, deep chest, lovely coat, and beautiful ringed tail. She gives you that complete picture both standing and moving. She moves as if she is on air. Her conditioning was impeccable. She may be nine years old on paper and have had two litters but you would never believe it seeing her in all her glory. She owned the ring that day.

Best Opposite Sex went to the brindle domino CH. GAZON THE TRUTH BE TOLD. He is a very handsome, masculine dog. He has a pretty head, strong arched neck, good topline, beautiful tail. He has that easy, floating movement. He looks as if he could be a littermate to the Winners

Dog. I noticed in the catalog that they are both out of the same sire Ch. Gazon Say What you Mean. Since there can only be one Best of Breed winner, the Award of Merit was instituted at the national to provide the judge with an award for dogs that he/she feels are of exceptional quality and worthy of the top award. This year's Award of Merits went to AM/ CAN CH. POLO'S IN THE AIR TONITE FCH., CH. THAON'S WANNADANCE, CH PIZZAZZ PEPPERMINT TWIST OA NAJ JC, CH. BAAKARA'S GRACE OF MY HEART and CH. TANTRA'S SOME LIKE IT HOT.

Best Puppy was awarded to the lovely moving black and tan bitch KASBAN DARK ANGEL OF WINSONG who was also Winners Bitch from the 9-12 month class under judge Helen Stein.

In general, there were dogs presented to me that were of good type with pretty heads and eyes, good balance...standing and moving, good toplines, tails, correct coat texture and large feet. Temperaments for the most part were good. However, there were a few shy ones in the dog classes. There were some poor toplines...dogs with long backs and long loins. There were dogs that had good reach and drive but lacked the spring in their gait that is unique to the Afghan Hound. I did see some sickle hocks as well. There were many dogs in good condition but there were also some that were quite soft. These dogs were bred to go over rough terrain so conditioning should always be of utmost importance. I only had two bites that were slightly off. However, I did see some mouths with quite a few missing teeth. I don't have a problem with a couple of missing premolars but I do have a problem with missing molars. I know that the standard only mentions what type of bite they are supposed to have and that they are to have a strong underjaw. However, they need their teeth and strong underjaws to be effective hunters.

#### **CRITIQUE - BITCHES**

The Afghan Hound Club of America held its 66th Specialty Show at a beautiful show site in perfect weather. This made my assignment of judging Bitch Classes all the more enjoyable, as I was prepared for any kind of weather! Show Chairman Donna Broucek along with her fantastic husband, Dennis Brown, did a bang-up job in making this a wonderful specialty, with every detail covered. Thank you to the members of the AHCA for inviting me to judge at this show!

I judged many lovely bitches and found several that I could have easily named Winners Bitch. My final choice was a bitch from the 9-12 month Puppy class; nearly a year old. She has a very pretty head with strong underjaw and nice detailing and dark nicely shaped eyes. Her expression is elegant and aloof WHEN she is behaving (which did not always happen). Moving, she covers ground freely and with a confident attitude. This bitch has lovely square balance and a long, low set tail, well-muscled hindquarters and prominent hipbones. She was at her best when posed alone — on her own — in the center of the ring. Elegant. Snazzy. Spirited. (WB Kasban Dark Angel of Winsong)

Reserve Winners Bitch was from the Open class. This is a leggy, short backed bitch with a strong underjaw and pretty, chiseled head with a dark almond eye. She is free moving and coordinated and has a classy, aloof appearance when standing.(RWB Landwehr's Bayou Blues Amare)

I must mention the beautiful class of 6-9 month puppy bitches. There were many puppies in this class that I liked very much, nice and square with proud carriage (not too upright, though) and free, coordinated movement. Wonderful temperaments and most were quite soundly built and sound moving.

Brood Bitch: A very nice entry of three families, my first place was a very lovely bitch herself, and her three offspring were all very similar in balance, type and movement. . (Ch Pahlavi Total Indulgence SC, F Ch)

Junior Showmanship: A very poised young man was my choice for Best Junior Handler. He was subtle in his handling and he moved as a team with his dog, at a proper speed. His dog was impeccably presented and this young man was very aware of how his dog responded to him. The other entrants in Jr. Showmanship were also quite good, although some are more smooth and natural than others in moving and stacking their dogs. These young people have put a lot of time and effort into maintaining coats and developing a rapport with their dogs, and they are all to be applauded! (Best Jr. -Kyle Conner)

Field Trial Bitch: First place is a very coordinated and athletic bitch with square balance and confident carriage. Quite patterned and she makes an exotic picture when standing.(FC Llacue's Malaguena F Ch GRC ORC)

Again, I know that so many of you worked very hard to make this show a success. The Afghan Hound Club of America Specialty Show is always a very treasured time for me and to think that we are all following in the tradition of so many wonderful Afghan Hounds and their breeders and owners from the past — well, that is awesome. #### **Obedience 2002**

The same course is used at each level as in the Standard and Jumpers with Weaves classes but the dogs are given 5 more seconds of time and the jump height is lowered 4".
