## JUDGES' COMMENTS

Gill Ullom Dogs & Intersex With Afghan entries down over the last few years, I was pleased with the numbers at this year's National. Of course this does present a dilemma, that being, the quality ran very deep in several of the classes and I was forced to leave rather nice quality dogs out of the ribbons. Then again, what a nice dilemma to encounter. The facility for this year's event was excellent, nice size ring, and the balconies for those staying in the suites presented a nice birds-eye view of all of the activity. I do think some dogs look better and perform to their utmost when being exhibited in a big grassy outdoor ring. Certainly I wouldn't take anything away from Sandy Nelson and her committees for a wonderful indoor venue, it is just a fact that some dogs do better outside as well as some at an inside venue.

My **Best of Breed** winner (**CH. MAYA'S TEH-OO-SEH OF SIMMON**) is a great representation of what the Afghan is all about. As I indicated at the awards dinner, there have been very few dogs that have brought me to tears and this is one of them. I just hope that some day each of you will experience those feelings about our breed and a particular dog or bitch. (Just as a side note, Ch. Mecca's Falstaff & Ch. Rajah's El Cid were the first for me.) The longer she was in the ring the better she performed, with that great silhouette of the angles, as she moved around the ring. When I approached her, she was literally gazing right through me! She felt good to go over with her shoulder angulation (and placement of her withers) and the return of the upper arm. I really liked the way her neck flowed into her shoulders and topline. The attitude she expressed on the free stack is just another

aspect of what makes our breed unique. This was her day! My **Best of Opposite** winner (**CH. POLO'S IN THE AIR TONIGHT**) is an impressive dog with a stallion attitude as though he owned the ring. His effortless powerful gait was a pleasure to watch. He was clean coming and going and was in immaculate condition.

The five Awards of Merit (**CH. FABELHAFT ZOOT SUIT, CH. REGIMES PICASSO OF KEYSTONE, CH. ETRIGAN THE PRETENDER, CH. JOROGZ' HEARTS CELEBRATION AND CH. BEACHBROOK'S ITS RAINING MEN**) were an impressive group. On another day, any one of them could have received the nod. When I look at this group, I am assured that we are continuing to breed to the standard and not just swayed with "the fad of the day". Now lets be realistic, no dog or bitch is perfect in every way, but those important qualities (type) that make our breed unique are at the forefront of the minds of those breeders who respect the standard.

**Winners Dog (KHAFKA'S EXOTIC SPICE)**, from the Bred-By-Exhibitor Class, is a very houndy dog with tremendous reach and drive in his powerful gait. The dog was in excellent condition with good angulation front and rear. He had a nice arched neck and a good topline. As I looked at this dog on the free stack, I thought, if he slipped his lead, he could retreat to the woods to kill a deer. **Reserve Winners Dog (DELOUBELLE CASBAR FULL POWER)**, from the Open Class, is an impressive dog with a smooth springy gait. He was clean coming and going with beautiful head piece. This dog was also nice to go over, not over done in any way. I understood later that he was Best in Sweeps at last year's National. He emerged from the Open class with several very

capable dogs oh so close. The second place blue brindle was an impressive looking dog and was handled to perfection. I really liked his exotic expression on a very houndy head piece. His movement was balanced with spring and I am sure that he will do very well for himself.

The American Bred class had two contenders with the cream dog going first. He was a nice mover and very much the look of the Afghan (type) with good angulation front and rear.

The Bred-By-Exhibitor class was one of the classes where the quality ran deep. I think this was one of my best classes of dogs (as one would expect at the National). After the first place dog, which was WD, the second place brindle dog was a strong contender. This dog's head and expression had great Afghan character. He had good angulation front and rear and a beautiful spring in his gait and was very clean coming and going. The third place black dog had beautiful carriage and felt great under all of that coat. His head was just a bit heavy for me, but masculine, and I think carried well with his body. He was a "ham" and having a great time in the ring. The fourth place dog, again a well balanced dog, was clean coming and going, with great style on the individual go around.

In the 12-18 Month Dog class, first was a striking white dog with a piercing masculine expression. He had an effortless smooth gait with a good front and rear. I would suggest that this young dog has a great career ahead of him. The second place black & silver dog while working on his confidence the ring, had a beautiful head with moments of great balance as he circled the ring. Third place was a brindle and with his young handler presented a good

team. This young dog had good front and rear angulation and his coat pattern, complete with bare pasterns, is another unique characteristic of our breed. The confidence he expressed in the ring demanded your attention. The fourth place dog, another brindle had a majestic striking look and nice easy balanced gait.

9-12 Puppy Dog Class, the first place black masked fawn male, mature for his age had a nice smooth gait with a nice head and expression. The second place black & tan, again with that expression as though he is looking through you, had a nice head, neck and topline, with a smooth balanced gait and he was really challenging the first place dog. The third place shaded mask red dog was a houndy dog with an exotic expression and he had a very wide open side gait with lots of spring although there were moments when his timing was not always smooth. The fourth place cream dog was a nice houndy puppy having a great time in the ring. One could definitely see the potential of this young dog as he did have moments of great style as I put him through his paces.

6-9 Puppy Dog Class, the first place blue puppy was clean coming and going with a nice balanced gait and houndy look for his young age. The second place black & tan didn't quite have himself ready to be competitive, but had nice angles all around and the third place black puppy had an admirable expression but unsure of himself in the ring and difficult to evaluate on the move.

It was nice to see two entries in the field dog class. Both of the brindles were Dual Champions each having nice easy flowing gait with the first place dog being just a bit smoother on the go around.

First, I would like to congratulate Sandy Nelson and her staff for putting on an outstanding 68th National Specialty. The hotel was very welcoming, the ring was huge, and there was lots of room for exhibitor grooming and vendors ringside. The ring decor and photo backdrop were outstanding, and really made the theme "Northern Lights" come alive.

I was privileged to judge the bitch classes, and I absolutely adored my winner's class. Every one of these beautiful girls is deserving of their titles. They were as follows:  
1st 6-9 puppy bitch: Sha-Cone Abaca Delovely- very aptly named, as she is lovely, beautiful pale blue brindle, soundly made and very sure of herself.  
1st 9-12 puppy bitch: Joha Galaxy Solo Swiftwind- powder puff blue, a bit bigger than I normally like, but very feminine and beautiful, and moved like a dream. She also was Best in Sweepstakes and Best Puppy.  
1st 12-18 bitch: Arcana Suhden's Ms. America- red brindle and of a very proper size. This very pretty and feminine girl charmed and moved her way through a very competitive class.  
1st Bred By Exhibitor: Thaon's Stardance- absolutely gorgeous black/blue bitch. Beautiful everything from head to tail. She was beautifully presented with great style and grace. She literally owned the ring. It was

my great pleasure to award her Winners Bitch, and Gill Ullom also awarded her BOW and Best Bred By Exhibitor  
1st: American Bred: Hosanna Price Above Rubies- a very nice red brindle of proper size, she was a very pleasant surprise to find in this underrated class.  
1st Open bitch: Khafka's Eyes Of The Tiger- Beautiful blue brindle domino. This bitch is divine with everything in the right place. She was also handled with great style and dignity. My final decision finally came down to her and my Bred By Bitch, with Thaon's Stardance simply exhibiting greater style and movement. I was very pleased to award her Reserve Winners Bitch.

In closing, I would like to thank the membership of the AHCA for inviting me to judge the bitch classes of the 68th annual specialty.

## Barb Bornstein - Sweepstakes

It was a pleasure to judge Sweepstakes in St. Cloud, Minnesota. My Sweepstakes entry was wonderful, but judging Sweepstakes can be problematic because of several factors. While the Sweeps judge has the first opportunity to see the Afghan Hound youngsters, these youngsters do not always perform at their best. The youngsters have traveled for a day, or for several days, they are bathed and groomed and then introduced to a new venue, new people and a new surface to move on. Often these youngsters are tired and a bit unsure and do not perform at their best. The judge must go with what he or she can.... finding winners from each class that day. It was not uncommon for the Regular Class judges Gill Ullom or Bobbie Keller to reverse some of my placements as my second place winners had settled down rightfully winning blue ribbons in their regular classes.

My Best Opposite to Best in Sweepstakes was a young male KASBAN AMERICAN IDOL who was stunningly beautiful. He was on his way to BIS but was only outshined by the dynamite blue bitch, JOHA GALAXY SOLO SWIFT-WIND, who simply refused to let down. This classy young bitch carried her royal attitude through the Liberty class and Gill also awarded her Best

Puppy in Show. Both the BOS and the BIS winners won their classes under Gill and Bobbi. I was disappointed in some exhibitors who openly displayed displeasure at their placements under me. Come on folks its only one show! One exhibitor purchased a still photograph of her dog in full stride bringing this photograph to me in order to inform me how wrong I was that I did not place her Afghan Hound. While the still photo of the dog was very lovely it did not illustrate how hard the dog's feet were hitting the ground, nor the wasted motion of the topline. The photograph did not reveal the movement of the dog either coming or going. Exhibitors should think twice about doing this type of thing to a judge and not use a single picture of their dog to intimidate or embarrass a judge. It doesn't work and only makes the exhibitor look very foolish. Besides, I have a very good memory when it comes to judging dogs.

Sandy Nelson outdid herself chairing this National. And no, the rumor is not true that the National will be held in St. Cloud every three years. This facility was wonderful and there were many comments from exhibitors about the pleasantness of the hotel staff. Minnesota has long been known for its quality of workers and outstanding service so none of this came as a surprise to me. The Northern Lights theme will shine on for years to come. It was a fabulous show and great fun besides.

Go to the U. of Wisconsin-Madison vet school website for more info. I believe they will apply \$2000 cost relief to dogs that are in the study.

For any of you out there that have had dogs or know of dogs who have had chylothorax could you please send him information on how your dog was treated and what the outcome was. ## DELEGATES REPORT

(The highlights of the September Delegates Meeting were included in my report at the AHCA Annual Meeting in October.)

On September 13 and 14, the quarterly meeting of the Delegates was held in NYC. The Delegates' List prior to the meeting was alive with discussion about the Online Breeders Classified (OBC) initiative. The 348 delegates arrived at the meetings armed with facts, fiction, opinions, comments, suggestions and ready for prime time.

The major portion of the caucus on Monday was devoted to the pros and cons surrounding the OBC. Excellent points were offered by both supporters and opponents of the program. OBC was to have been up and running by July, we were told, but was being held off until after the Delegates meeting. Some of the concern on the part of the Delegates seemed to be that the OBC was to have been in place before the member clubs, their respective members, nor their Delegates to the AKC had the opportunity for comment, input, or review. Additional topics at the Caucus were votes to be taken the next day and the response of the dog fancy to the recent Florida hurricanes.

The Parent Club Committee took up the balance of the day. The committee agenda was full as was the meeting room.

Mike Leosis (AKC Staff) reviewed the approval process for Regional Specialty Clubs. Among the criteria were territory, reason(s) for formation, By-laws, elections, accomplishments, number of households represented and radius distance.

Additional topics discussed were:

The Show Site Directory and Parent Club access to this. A letter was sent to each Club's Corresponding Secretary and a second letter will be sent as it was reported some Clubs were having difficulty with access.

The upcoming parent Club Conference

- The Dock and Crop Issue
- Selection criteria use for judges for the AKC Invitational Show
- OBC and the role, impact on and concerns of Parent Clubs
- Stud book content and its ownership by the AKC (This has implications for Parent Clubs that publish pedigree books using this content).

On Tuesday morning we began with the Delegate's forum. The chair of the Conflict of Interest committee, David Merriam gave a status report of that Committee's activities. The charge to the Committee was to examine the existing provisions and make recommendations for possible change. Relevant documents have been reviewed by the Committee as well as the New York State Not-For-Profit

statutes. The need to redefine the principles of Sportsmanship for all involved in the sport (Judges, Exhibitors, Staff, etc.) as well as what is the expected conduct at events were presented. The Chair asked for comments and suggestions and stated to date there were about 8-10 responses. He responded to questions and was asked to provide the proposed content for comment when it is completed.

Following the Committee report the Chairman of the Board, Ron Menaker and the President, Dennis Sprung responded to Delegate's questions (it seemed that some of the questions were more of a statement than a question) Information about the upcoming AKC Invitational show was provided by Ron, the show chair, and concern was raised that the AKC Invitational as currently planned will conflict with shows held on that weekend around the country. The first three Invitationals were held during the week and avoided weekend days. The next show Jan 15 and 16, 2005 will air live on TV both Saturday and Sunday nights. Thus the date conflict.

The Delegates' meeting once called to order began with voting for the Delegate's Committees. The election was for positions on the 12 Committees. Terms of service are from one to three years. The results were announced



later in the afternoon.

The reports of the CFO, President and Chair were given and are published in the Gazette as well as on line for your reading pleasure.

The votes on rule changes were conducted with two of the five generating discussion. First was the amendment which would clarify the disqualification of dogs that repeatedly threaten or menace judges ^ or the Bad Dog goes the Dog Show rule. It was reported that in 2003 there were 126 dogs excused for the first time at shows but only 4 were excused a second time. The final wording which was adopted stated "a dog recorded as excused for threatening or menacing by judges on 2 occasions will be administratively disqualified by the American Kennel Club". Judging dogs should not be an Act of Bravery!

The second proposed change dealt with Field Trial Rules for Pointing Breeds and would have required the results of these events to be received by the AKC in 7 days " not merely mailed within 7 days. This change was presented as a hardship for these clubs and was not approved by the Delegates.

Next up was the OBC program which was presented in full for the Delegate Body. This concept, it is hoped, will

connect the puppy buying public with breeders via the AKC. Rather than going to the pet stores or other puppy outlets (Brokers, Pet Stores, „flea markets, auctions or dealers can not be listed on the AKC/OBC) the public can link up directly with breeders using the OBC via the AKC web site. Many comments and suggestions were offered by the Delegates but in general the concept seemed well received by the end of the day.

In closing a replay of a Judge Judy's TV program was screened. It was one of the best promotions for the AKC I have ever seen and without a doubt the most hilarious. It seems a puppy was purchased, turned out nothing like the breed it was purported to be and the owner took the „breeder to court. The registry the breeder used was nothing anyone had ever heard of ^ and the Judge was not amused! I lost count of the Judge's references to the AKC. It was well into double digits.

It was a great end to two very long days.

Policies and Procedures will be corrected relating to lure coursing awards. There should be two awards (ASFA and AKC) even if they are awarded to the same dog. The ASFA plaque should always be listed in the ASFA premium list. Garry Newton has agreed to be the AHCA Representative to the AKC Coursing Advisory Committee.

### National Specialty Show

A motion was made and passed, to buy two tubs to be used at a national event, and then auction them off. This would solve the problem of transporting the tubs from one event to the next.

### 2005 National Specialty:

Abbe reported that the 2005 National will be held in Sacramento, CA from October 17 - 21, followed by the Northern California Specialty on Saturday and two all-breed shows on Sunday and Monday.

A motion was made and passed to change the exhibiting restriction on a dog owned or co-owned by the designated people (Bench Show Committee, Show Chair, President and members of their households) to one year rather than two, prior to the National Specialty.

### Obedience:

Claudia will review the rules for Rally Obedience and add it to the options for the Versatility Award. Rally obedience will be offered at the National in Sacramento.

### Agility:

Agility at the 2005 National Specialty was discussed. Judy Bloom will look for a site within an hour of the show site, and/or the cost to rent and transport equipment if we had it at the host hotel.

### Public Education:

Janie Getz will coordinate the AHCA display at the AKC/Eukanuba Classic in Tampa on January 14 & 15 2005.

### Regional Clubs:

Sand and See AHC in Florida has received AKC approval to hold its first specialty show. There are currently 37 clubs licensed to hold specialty shows. A motion was made and passed to approve no more than two (2) regional specialty shows on the same weekend (Friday - Monday), anywhere in the country. This does not affect any currently approved club situation.

### Rescue:

A motion was made and passed to place a rescue ad in Dog Fancy on a one-year trial basis.
