The 75th Anniversary Afghan Hound Club of America National Specialty is now history. We met in Wilmington, OH for a week full of activities from early light well into the night. Jody Gardner chaired this year's event and Eukanuba sponsored the event with the inauguration of Eukanuba Hall at the Robert's Centre. If you missed it, you missed a great event. There is further info on the event later in this issue.

Unfortunately, the general meeting lost a quorum prior to the discussion of certain items listed on the agenda. The next general meeting is in Arizona in March, with the Breeders' Cup, so these items may be addressed if a quorum is present there. Please make plans to be in Arizona so there will be a quorum.

In addition, the By-Laws Committee gave the results of their last survey where the three items of the three various types of membership were supported. The Committee must also address amendments to the Articles of Incorporation as well as other By-Laws issues. When they have completed their task, they will confer with AKC and a New York lawyer/parliamentarian to verify that all items are correct prior to a ballot being sent to the membership. Please know that you must respond to the ballot. If these items do not pass by a 2/3 majority, they will not be affirmed. This could have major consequences for the club.

The board voted to ask Martha Parks Powell to investigate some of the issues that remain concerning rescue, the club and the trust. She will report to the new officers next year.

In addition, Eddie Kominek is going to revamp the web site and add a members only login so that messages to members may be disseminated in a timely manner. This will require a new URL, which has already been reserved. The new website should be accomplished by the time the new officers take office February 1st.

This is the last message to you from me as the President of the club. It has been an eventful two years, and although there has been much misunderstanding, I am glad to know that the By-Laws and Articles of Incorporation, which have needed revision, are now being addressed. Correcting these items is very easy. It only takes you as members to vote when the time arrives.

I do hope that more people will become involved with the breed and the club and I encourage you to volunteer and agree to participate when asked. The AHCA is a club made of all members and there are so many of you who can make valuable contributions.

CHARLIE'S STORY Submitted by Marcia Morelli

Charlie was a therapy dog. Charlie was also a rescue, found living in an abandoned phosphate mine in central Florida. In his too short time with us, Charlie touched many lives. Charlie was living proof that a dog who was discarded like yesterday's newspaper was in fact a true treasure.

We never planned for Charlie to become a therapy dog. We only wanted to make him whole and happy. After what he had obviously been through, he deserved peace and happiness and so much more. Although we didn't realize it, Charlie really was a therapy dog from the first moment he walked through our front door. Here was this skeletal, hairless, mangy, heartworm positive shell of a dog, with lifeless eyes, completely without hope. As we worked to bring him back to full health, we saw the light come back into his eyes and the incredible personality, so long repressed, emerge. Charlie changed and, in the process, he changed us too, forever.

The abuse and neglect he had endured never mattered to him. Everyone he met was a potential new best friend. If a group of people came to our house, Charlie, with no prompting, would make sure to greet each one, taking the time to stop and visit before moving on to the next person. No one was ever left out. We were proud to share his story in the AHCA rescue book, *The Road I Took to You*, compiled by Doug Vinson. His story was appropriately called "Charlie Makes Me Smile." At his first rescue parade at the St. Louis National, he was called "glorious" by a spectator and his story was mentioned by David Frei at the banquet. Charlie was already touching lives, a therapy dog in the making.

For several years we participated at the Florida State Fair's purebred dog exhibit. This was a venue where dog clubs showcase their breeds. I can still see Charlie on his first visit, standing proudly on a grooming crate, surrounded by a sea of people, all reaching out to touch him, all with smiles on their faces. One year it finally hit us as we watched Charlie sitting quietly, for 20 minutes, while a mentally handicapped young man in a wheelchair rested his hand on Charlie's head. There was a look of total bliss on both their faces. That was when we realized Charlie WAS truly a therapy dog. All that was missing was the certification to prove it!

The successful completion of the Canine Good Citizen test was the first step. Charlie breezed through it, and made two new friends in the process – the women giving the test! He was on his way. We chose to try for the certification offered by Therapy Dogs International, and studied the requirements carefully. The main hurdle, in our mind, would be walking by food on the

floor without eating it (designed to protect a dog from accidently ingesting any type of medication). How many times in his past had this dog gone without food? Could we really expect him to walk by food without grabbing it? Our test was scheduled to take place in a nursing home - a true trial by fire. We arrived in the morning, me more nervous than Charlie, and began working our way through the home and through the parts of the test as well. Charlie excelled! In all his glory, this kind, gentle soul went from room to room, bringing joy and smiles along the way. Food on the floor? Forget that! Charlie was too busy making new friends. PASSING his certification with flying colors, Charlie won his "Best in Show" that day.

We would encourage anyone whose dog has the right temperament to try for therapy certification. I guarantee you won't find anything more rewarding. Do therapy dogs touch lives and make a difference? Absolutely! Once we stopped to visit with an elderly lady in the hallway of the home. She was enchanted with Charlie. As we walked away, the aides said "In two minutes she won't even remember him." Much later as we were leaving, we walked past the same lady. She called to us, "Don't you leave without saying goodbye to me, Charlie." You can imagine the looks of amazement.

Sadly, Charlie's therapy work was cut short by health issues, caused by severe damage to his heart from the heartworm. I still carry his TDI card in my wallet; he earned his title and made us so proud to have him in our lives. His memory may bring tears, but he still makes us smile.

He was simply Charlie, CGC, TDI. He was simply magical.

CANINE HEALTH REPORT Submitted by Health Chair, Eileen Laudermilch, RN, CCRN

First and foremost, I would like to thank the membership for the opportunity of attending the Canine Health Conference held in St. Louis from August 12 – 14. There was a wealth of information and I intend to share some of it in this column. One thing that I learned is that other sighthound breed clubs got together and sent a 50 dog batch of thyroid draws to attempt to change the "normal" ranges in their breeds and have been successful. Afghan Hounds have a great many "equivocals" which are due to lower than the normal T4's. This is the only way we can accomplish a change as a group effort. The National this year resulted in only 18 thyroid draws. Thank you to all who participated. Please plan to test your dog at the next National. The 2013 Breeders' Cup will require CHIC testing at that time. The clinics at our National Specialty offer a reduced rate, so plan for next year!

On an equally serious note, I wish to share some of the information I received regarding current research trials. Many of them have monies attached for dogs entered in the study which will help to pay for medications, scans and other procedures. I feel this information is of great importance.

Clinical trials in veterinary oncology at the University of Minnesota:

- 1. COTCO16: A pilot study to assess feasibility of tissue collections and molecular profiling for future comparative oncology personalized medicine studies Participation in the study involves a single collection of samples, specifically blood, saliva and a biopsy of the tumor. Owners get to choose the treatment option. The study pays for collection and provides \$1,000. that can be used to cover the cost of evaluation and future expenses at the Veterinary Medical Center. This is open to any breed of dog with oral melanoma.
- 2. Nationwide study to evaluate novel therapeutic agent for the treatment of solid tumors in dogs Dogs are eligible if they meet the following inclusion criteria: a). diagnosis of melanoma, osteosarcoma, soft tissue sarcoma, or squamous cell carcinoma. (biopsy or needle aspirate). b). measurable tumor (primary or metastasis) that is at least 1 cm in diameter. c). generally feeling well (ie., eating drinking, ambulating on their own, etc.). d). no evidence of an active bacterial infection requiring antibiotics (other than topical medications) in the past seven days. e). no anti-cancer therapy within the past 21 days (including chemotherapy, radiation therapy, corticosteroids, or immunotherapy). f). no tumors where abscess (infection) would result in major symptoms. The study will cover all costs associated with the therapy as well as some diagnostic tests, including lab tests, chest X-rays, and abdominal ultrasound. The study will also pay for medical management of side effects.
- 3. Bone cancer immunotherapy using a genetically modified Salmonella Dogs need to meet certain criteria to qualify for the study. Dogs who have untreated osteosarcoma that has not spread beyond the primary site and are otherwise in good health may be eligible. There is a financial incentive for participation. Specifically, the study will cover the costs of the study visits on day one (PET/CT, bone biopsy, and Salmonella IL2 therapy), rechecks, and the costs associated with amputation, up to a total of \$2,000. All cost associated with PET/CT imaging will also be covered by the study.
- 4. <u>Preclinical evaluation of adjuvant Minnelide in dogs with appendicular osteosarcoma a pilot study</u> Financial incentives will include defrayment of costs associated with amputation and vascular port placement (meaning under the skin access to a large vein), Minnelide (single drug agent) and its administration and recheck visits during the study period.
- 5. A gene therapy clinical trial for dogs with glioma Gliomas are tumors that arise from the supportive tissue of the brain. These are common aggressive tumors that have a poor prognosis. Eligible dogs must have a tentative diagnosis of glioma based on MRI showing a tumor with the right characteristics. We also have another clinical trial for dogs with gliomas using vaccine therapy in addition to surgical removal of the tumor. We are looking for 35 dogs.
- 6. <u>LICKing Lymphoma A clinical trial for spontaneous diffuse large B cell lymphoma in dogs</u> So far 6 dogs have completed the study process with no severe treatment-related toxicity. Enrollment will continue until the study has accrued a total of 20 dogs. Owners receive a \$2,500 incentive for allowing their dog to participate in this study. This covers most, if not all of the chemotherapy related treatment costs.
- 7. COTC007b: Preclinical comparison of three indeniosioquinolines candidates in tumor-bearing dogs This is a clinical trial that assesses the safety and efficacy of three newly developed chemotherapy agents when given to dogs with lymphoma. This study will pay for test drugs, chemo administration, and sample collection procedures and will provide a \$1,000 incentive for participation.

These are only some of the trials open for study that involve monetary reimbursement for the trials. For more information regarding these and other studies please contact www.cvm.umn.edu/accr. I feel, if this information can help one dog, it is well worth it.

Author's Note: The third quarter report from OFA showed ten dogs received their CHIC numbers!



The video website, www.afghanhoundclubofamerica.com, had 8,284 unique hits as indicated by a unique 'hit' counter placed visibly on the page for a grand total of 70,275 total hits for the duration of the event.

The Premium List was downloaded 159 times, which makes sense since we didn't have it up very long. The Judging Program was downloaded 844 times.

Sweepstakes classes had an average of 302 online viewers. Dog classes had an average of 475 online viewers, and bitch classes averaged 499 online viewers. Parade of Rescue averaged 505 online viewers, and Best of Breed had a peak of 604 average online viewers.

The majority of viewers, were from Facebook, followed by the AHCA website. Not one Twitter user was found! The top countries viewing the event were from Finland, Canada, Australia, Italy, Sweden, Germany and Norway. Plus some rather interesting stats from countries that aren't normally in the news.

I was extremely pleased to see all the people chatting real-time on Facebook as the judging was occurring - dogs, handlers, judges, all were discussed in great detail at the exact same time they were all watching. It was really something to be a part of this. The Afghan Hounds International Facebook site run by Pam Croft had by far the largest user base online discussing the show as it happened. Those of you on Facebook, have a look at Pam's site - it's almost unbelievable the amount of discussion that occurred.

Mike (Jody's hubby) ran the camera just as much as I did and deserves equal operator credit.

I had a blast doing this for the club and I certainly hope they consider doing it on a much larger scale for future events. I really would have liked to have had the catalog ahead of time so that I could have input the dog's information placing it on the screen as

each dog was examined. I also would have loved to have had 2 more cameras... maybe next time.





SWEEPSTAKES CRITIQUE By Judge, Tony Saia

First I would like to thank the AHCA membership for granting me the privilege of judging their 75th National Sweepstakes. Also a big thanks to the Show Chair, Jody Garner, and her committee for putting on yet another remarkable show. I have to add an official thank you to my three wonderful ring stewards who kept the judging moving.

6-9 Puppy Dog: Kuhl Breeze Designer Sock Monkey. A beautifully put together black and tan puppy. This puppy had a great square outline, lovely head piece, and with the correct small dark eye. I almost lost him for his first place ribbon, but when I moved the entire class for the 2nd time my eyes zoomed right on him as he floated across the blue carpet. This puppy took command of his class. The 2nd and 3rd place puppies were also both very square but they were not as collected on the move as my class winner. All placements here were of similar square balance.

9-12 Puppy Dog: Kasban Sura Bell Bottom Blues. My class winner was a well-built blue brindle dog. He had a nice neck set which was well placed into his shoulders, plus he enjoyed a very strong topline. This dog had balanced side gait and was sound on the up and back. I preferred the outline of the 2nd place, but he was not performing and moving with ease with his handler. Later I noted that both these dogs were littermates.

12-15 Puppy Dog: This class had some very good depth of quality. I both admired both my 1st and 2nd place winners. Both had great square outlines, with great neck sets that flowed smoothly onto their firm toplines. Both dogs were great on the move, as well as my 3rd place dog. All moved correctly with balanced reach and drive, and all had the lift this breed desperately needs. The winner of this class, **Regle Jakar Wise Guy at Pamir**, won because he had it all, beautiful breed type, a magnificent headpiece, with a Roman nose, long tail and when he moved he moved the way an Afghan Hound should. He was a joy to watch as he floated nicely, neither fast nor racing around the ring. Everything about this black mask silver shouted "Classic" Afghan Hound breed type.

<u>15-18 Dogs</u>: Fu Blu Riddle of Oshanameh. This standard size black and tan won his class by just moving correctly around the ring. He was smooth on the move, and in structure nice to go over, had no lumps or bumps. This dog held his outline when he moved, and this is a very important point for me and should be for all who are breeding and showing Afghan Hounds. Dogs should not move with their withers 3 inches higher than their hipbones. This dog was also sound on the up and back. The 2nd place dog was nice to go over, had a lovely head, but was not as light on his feet when he moved.

<u>6-9 Puppy Bitch</u>: Andros Glitter in the Air. This bitch was just almost too perfect. She possessed a striking headpiece, tiny eye, had a great set under front, topped off with a perfect ring tail. She was almost flawless from her head to her tail.

When she moved she had moments of greatness, but she was off and on. I was able to forgive this because she had way too many fine virtues that compensated for her puppy bitch attitude.

<u>9-12 Puppy Bitch</u>: Mahali Capri. This blue brindle bitch was another extremely well put together Afghan Hound. She had textbook balance, another fantastic headpiece, tiny dark eye, solid top, but it was when she moved that she had the edge over the 2nd placement. I had to tell her handler to move her slower, because this was when she came off the ground with the correct spring and lift that should be associated with this breed. When giving out the ribbons, I thought this bitch was the one to beat.

<u>12-15 Puppy Bitch</u>: When Red Means Gold of Dega Afghans. A nicely balanced red bitch who also, when moved at the right speed, had the correct gait. She was sound on the up and back, had a good strong topline that held it together when she moved.

<u>15-18 Bitch</u>: Luna Azul Von Haussman. This was a nicely balanced blue bitch. She was good to go over and also had a nice flow of neck into her shoulders. She won out over the 2nd place because she did not race around the ring as her handler moved her at the right pace.

For my Best in Sweepstakes, I was very pleased to see all my class winners work for the top honor. It was a difficult choice to select two winners out of this group. I made my decision based on our standard and what I feel is most important to the Afghan Hound breed. I firmly believe that spot-on breed type along with correct movement was awarded this day. Both my Best in Sweepstakes and Best of Opposite Sex were absolutely magnificent in every aspect of our breed standard. Both had outstanding outlines, stunning headpieces, and both moved with spring and lift. The only negative thing that I could say about both winners is that I am jealous they are not in my house.







AKC DELEGATE'S REPORT Submitted by Connie Butherus AHCA Delegate to the AKC October 14, 2011

The quarterly meeting of the AKC Delegates was held Sept 12th and 13th, once again at the usual venue near Newark Airport.

The Delegate's Committees lead off the sessions and fill the first day.

The Parent Club Committee, on which I serve as an elected member, is my usual first appointment. The agenda is always relevant to Parent Club concerns and issues. However, due to the absence of AKC staff, now not permitted to attend Delegate Meetings (in an effort to cut costs) we were unable to reach closure on several items. The two Board Liaisons tried to be responsive but left much to be desired as they seemed not always in sync.

Significant items addressed included:


- Summary of ideas and suggestions to encourage greater inclusion of Juniors into clubs.
- Reintroduction of a 3 point major award for RWD/RWB at one national specialty where the entry for that sex is greater than double the requirement for 5 points. This proposed amendment lost the required 2/3 needed to pass in 2003 with 168 of the delegates in favor and 121 opposed. It is thought these many years later the vote may be more exhibitor friendly.
- The approval of holding concurrent independent specialty shows with all breed shows was reviewed. The venue size will be assessed by AKC staff and the entry limited to 100 (which would include the sweeps entries if offered).

The next Committee I attended was Canine Health. Many items addressed are relevant to Parent Club Delegates. Items covered include:

- Health requirements stipulated by Parent Clubs for the Breeder of Merit program. I served on a joint subcommittee which addressed the problem of great inconsistencies found in many Parent Club documents/websites. This was then addressed at the CHF Parent Club Conference (August) with the Parent Club health representatives attending.
- Individuals holding Breeder of Merit status granted in one breed moving on to additional breeds and using the Breeder of Merit designation in those breeds, while not having met the health requirements stipulated for the additional breeds.
- The CHF Parent Club conference was a great success. The focus was canine cancers. Speakers were assessed as outstanding. In attendance were 268 club representatives and 27 vet students from 17 vet schools. This was funded by OFA, AHF, AKC and Purina
- The CHF has approved \$1.5 million in large grants for the next year and an additional \$260,000 in small (\$12,000 limit) grants for a total of 21 research awards.

The Delegate caucus was hot and heavy with discussion and opinions being freely exchanged. Of significance were the following:

Group realignment is not only alive and well, it is proposing significant changes to the existing structure. For those who objected to 10 groups, they will hate 11 groups which is now being proposed. The suggested realignment structure proposed is as follows:

Sporting Group divided into:

- 1) Pointers and Setters
- 2) Retrievers and Spaniels

Hound Group divided into:

- 3) Scent
- 4) Sight

Working expanded into:

- 5) Utility (Guard)
- 6) Mollasors (Mastiff type)
- 7) Spitz type
- 8) Terrier
- 9) Toy
- 10) Non-Sporting
- 11) Herding

With the breeds now recognized in FSS and Miscellaneous and assuming no change in group structure, by 2014 the group size was reported to be projected as:

If all goes as planned, the Delegate vote would be sometime in 2012. If approved, implementation would be in 2014-2015. The Delegates are allowed to vote on the number of groups. The AKC Board designated the breeds assigned to each group.

♦ The awarding of "Honorable Mention" ribbons is permitted for Junior Showmanship. The exact wording can be obtained from the Events department. Nice idea as it would be to designate a Reserve Best Jr. Something to work toward.

The last meeting of the day was the coordinating Committee at which the various Committee chairs reported on their meetings and recommendations. Not surprisingly the absence of AKC staff at the meetings generated much discussion, comment and expressed concern. A solution was presented for Board consideration. The staff were deemed to be of great value to the entire process.

On 9-13-2011 the day started with the Forum which was a delightful presentation entitled "Field Trials 101." It is important to honor the events which enhance the natural abilities of our breeds.

The actual meeting began with the various reports:

- The Chair addressed the upcoming Meet the Breeds events. The Nov 19-20 event will be jointly hosted by the AKC and the International Cat Association (too many comments to include!). Many special attractions will be presented to enhance the experience for the spectators.
- The President's Report focused on the 9/11 tragedy and subsequent actions taken by the AKC, dog fancy and supporters. The DOGNY project raised \$3.5 M to support Search and Rescue dogs getting an X-ray machine to Ground Zero (Afghan Hound people were the ones who got it on site) the generous support of Fed Ex (Afghan Hound judge and breeder Honi Reisman on the Fed Ex staff to be thanked here) and many others who recognized the needs and filled the gap. Not a dry eye in the room when he was done with his report!
- The financial report brought everyone back to the business at hand. The losses and gains were all outlined. In the first 8 months of 2011 a 1% loss of \$662,000 was recorded (from investments). The Reserve Balances were deemed to be "healthy," but the downward spiral in registrations continues to hammer all areas of the organization and new sources of income are needed and soon, in order to stem the hemorrhage and address the net deficit. Register your puppies!

Four amendment votes were next:

- Prohibiting an individual who has misappropriated funds from the AKC from becoming a Delegate -- Passed.
- ♦ An appeal process open for an individual being denied seating as a Delegate by the AKC Board Passed.
- Reserve Best in Show award to be implemented Passed (a counted vote of 248 yeas and 85 opposed).
- Various changes in wording to bring 7 sections of various rules into compliance and internal consistency. Housekeeping details -- Passed.

The balance of the meeting was devoted to items presented by various Delegates. The absence of staff at the meetings was again the thrust of many of the comments. Suggestions were offered, but nothing new was offered as a solution.

As a side note – The election of members for the Delegate Committees was also held. Elected to the Dog Show Rules Committee was Duane Butherus, representing Delaware Water Gap Kennel Club and a longtime Afghan Hound addict! If you don't like the rules you now know to whom to complain!

Next meeting is in Orlando, FL, December 15 and 16.
