AKC Delegate Report

Connie Butherus

he AKC Annual Meeting and elec tion of Board of Directors members was held March 14, 2023. The Delegate Committee meetings were on the preceding day. Election to fill the three positions on the Board was all the buzz as there were four candidates for the three positions to be filled. The slate from the Nominating Committee included three incumbents. There emerged an additional name nominated by endorsements. The Delegates received emails letters and phone calls in support of one or the other of the four. My vote was instructed by the AHCA Board.

The die was cast in one vote which was a bit of a surprise considering the amount of communication encumbering our collective email boxes. The three incumbents were all reelected.

Charles Garvin, Steve Hamblin and Dan Smyth prevailed and will serve another four years. The Board Chair, **Tom** Davies, and Vice Chair, Dominic Carota were also retained. The leadership team at the AKC continues unchanged. In official reports some were reminded of the HR term "Hero Sheet" used for job assessment reviews.

As this was the Annual Meeting the accomplishments of the AKC were cited. The Chair, Tom Davies, reported on the success of the Orlando show and its related events. He further noted the contributions of AKC TV, the relationship with ESPN and its viewership re AKC events. He noted that the AKC now offers 26 different areas of the sport.

Dennis Sprung, President, continued with additional successful and growth areas of the organization. In 2022 events and entries increased, registrations continued to grow, the success of the recent Meet the Breeds (NYC) and the contributions made by Government Relations, Canine College and the PR areas. He announced that the AKC is developing a course to better prepare Stewards. He added that the Orlando events had an entry of 9,000 plus. One assumes that reflects entries not necessarily dogs.

The CFO, Ted Phillips, outlined the financial picture as of December 31, 2022. As noted, registrations continue to grow. Litter registrations have increased, however individual dog registration were down from the 2021 numbers. It has been previously reported that this area is the core business of the AKC and

69% of revenue. Events grew by 12 % with entries.

This proposed amendment change is to expand the awarding of three points to Reserve Winners Dog/Bitch at any Specialty Show with an entry of double the requirement for five points in the area/sex. This provisions is now permitted at the breed National Specialty shows exclusively. There was serious and emotional discussion with the pros and cons holding forth. The Parent Club Commit-order at 3;01 PM EST by tee declined to vote on this at the time of the meeting. A final decision is pending further information. He and Fran urged Clubs to work at the grass roots level in developing programs for Juniors, It is important for local clubs -ALL Breed and Specialty - to have programs for the Juniors in their area and to develop them into future breeders. Doug explained his work with his grandchildren in this area. Mari-Beth noted that 100 Clubs have Junior Coordinators.

2023 - Helen stated that those working on this will meet in January 2023 to address the format and content.

Pedigree Data Base -

Peter sent an email today of the outline for a proposed PC survey regarding Pedigree Data Bases. He will limit the

responses to one per PC. There was discussion regarding doing this survev.

Helping Clubs Develop

Breeder Education-There was further discussion regarding **Breeder Education** Coordinator, Peter expressed concern that the AKC IT Department may not include the position in its annual club officer survey until May of 2023. The applications for the Eddy Awards are due in September which is the challenge.

Breeders' Cup 2023 Wrap Up Report

SITE/EQUIPMENT:

Cluster was very easy to deal with. Cluster Chair was very responsive. We would not hesitate to recommend returning.

Site was well received by attendees. Exhibitors and Spectators alike.

Grooming: While there was MUCH discussion about grooming (or the possible lack of it) it was a NON-issue. Yes, Afghan Hound Reserved Grooming was filled quickly. People arriving on Saturday had no issue finding undesignated spaces in view of the ring. 1. We needed to police some All-Breed Handlers who set up in the "Afghans Only" area. This was resolved professionally by all parties the first day of the cluster.

Parking: Ample for all Cars. Vans and RVs. No issue.

PC Signage: We had a lack of PC Logos, table runners, etc. from the National. They are being stored with a PC member. Recommend that the PC Runners are passed between Breeders' Cup Chair and National Chairs so they may be utilized at both events.

Regional Clubs were great. They did everything requested and more. Neither Amy nor myself are members of Potomac or Lehigh but we had a great working relationship with both Clubs. With less and less members in our regional clubs we do not feel that the BC Chair(s) needs to be local members.

Hospitality: Due to late judging (3:15pm) and Concessions closing early, an inexpensive sandwich buffet was offered to all attendees. Very well received. Fed approximately 40-50 people.

Judging: Scheduled at 3:15 or 15 minutes after Afghan Hound Judging. BC started at 3:30. 67 entered, 40 exhibited. Judging spanned 2 hours and 15 minutes with one 10 min break. Concluded at 5:42 pm

Live Stream: Live streaming was the issue of this event. I was hoping that it would happen organically as it has at other area specialties. What actually happened was spotty at best. There should have been an assigned Chair to coordinate live streams. While it's not required in our P&P's, it is becoming more and more expected by our global audience. Equipment/small budget may be needed for this to be of a level expected at a Parent Club event.

Show Secretary: Amy Mero took over as Show Secretary and did a great job. Dorma Sue was an accessible resource to aid in her success.

Entries: Not aware of any issues with entries or the Catalog as offered.

Stewards: Had one PC member assigned at the site. Added second Steward to insure flow when the final counts were announced. Suggest two or more when classes have more than 8 entries each

Financials: At the time this was written, a final financial report was still being processed by our Treasurer. I am sure you will be apprised of final numbers.

Logo sales: Logo items were sold on a pre order basis. Four items: Mens and Womens t-shirts: Mens and Womens fleece. No significant revenue. Recommend limiting offerings for future events, if offered at all.

Catalog Sales: We sold eight catalogs. Given the significant cost \$312 (more than the aforementioned 50-person hospitality) we question the necessity of offering PRINTED catalogs when online versions can be made available. Recommending only printing enough for the Judges/ Stewards. Amy printed up a separate Stewards Catalog that both Billy and Yancy appreciated. Offering a different incentive to donors (ie: logo note cards, etc) that is a cheaper printing option.

Fundraising. Trophy **Donations**

Observations: The Breeders Cup needs to remain rotating, separate from the National. Working with these local Clubs, the Breeders' Cup impact on their numbers is undeniable. Regardless of where the event is held

Regional Clubs MUST have this opportunity to create entries and create community in their regions. As a Parent Club we need to support the Regionals.

There is an argument that "no one is putting in bids". The Parent Club needs to do a BETTER JOB asking for the bids. I have been contacted by at least three different clubs/ regions that want to host the Breeder's Cup. The desire is there. This event has never cost our Club money. Let's keep it rotating.

This event should be scheduled/assigned 18-24 months out. I feel Amy and I are seasoned PC Event Chairs and yet we struggled.

This is a half day event. Planning during the last nine months was an absolute sprint.

Most notable the Litter/ entry schedule was unfeasible.

Personally, I feel this is a broken record. When it comes to National events it feels like we are putting out fires. We need to plan FARTHER OUT.

We want to set up our Regional Clubs and our Future Chairs/ Club members for success.

NOTE: Breeders' Cup 2024 is scheduled for April 26, 2024 hosted by the Afghan Hound Club of Dallas. Currently still soliciting bids for 2025.

Judge's Education Report

James Donahue

e have been busy at work with the ongoing development of the Online AKC Canine College Afghan Hound Course for prospective judges. In addition to dogs which had been photographed and recorded previously, we did further film in Orlando during the AKC National Championship this past December. Helen Stein. Connie Butherus, and myself, have been reviewing all collected media and working with the Canine College team to make necessary edits.

The Canine College Courses provide a comprehensive overview of the breed standard as well as important historical and functional concerns. At the end of each module there is a brief test to evaluate what has been learned. Prospective judges who successfully pass the course will receive two CEU credits

toward their application for Afghan Hounds. It is important to note that this is just one small piece of the puzzle in the education of judges interested in judging our breed and will not replace class room seminars, ringside mentoring, kennel visits, etc. We will keep our membership updated as this course progresses toward completion.

In December we presented our seminar and hands on workshop at the AKC Advanced Judge's Institute in Orlando. This was very well attended, with the Afghan seminar sold out within 48 hours of registration opening! I would like to thank everyone who brought dogs to the hands-on workshop. The class had a wide variety of styles. coat patterns, and ages to see and evaluate. This environment can be a lot for our breed, especially the youngsters. I was very impressed with how all of the dogs handled themselves, including the puppies. You are all to be congratulated on your socialization and attention to temperament!

The next stop for Judges education is Louisville, Kentucky, where American Dog Show Judges is presenting an Advanced Institute on hound breeds. Unfortunately, this is the same weekend as the Breeder's Cup in York. With an entry of only five Afghan Hounds, it will be difficult to provide a

suitable hands on experience, but I am working to ensure enough dogs will be available.

Finally, there was some discussion on the AHCA Facebook page regarding the list of AHCA approved judges' mentors. The current list is due to be updated, but this is temporarily on hold. Connie Butherus, our AKC Delegate, has informed us that the AKC Delegate Parent Club Committee is in the process of addressing guidelines regarding parent club approved mentors. Connie has been appointed to chair this committee, and we look forward to having her report back to us. It is likely that the AHCA Board will want to address and establish guidelines for AHCA judge's mentors once we have a report from the delegate committee.

Junior Showmanship Report Darla Miller

or the formal report I can say that as reported by Canine Chronicle, we have two juniors showing Afghan Hounds: Annalee Milam and Isabella Ruffoni. Annalee with four class wins and Isabella with one class win. The following are my thoughts about the idea that I have proposed to be shared with the Executive Committee.



A New Way of Detecting Cancer in Dogs and Cats

hen they reach middle to senior age, most dogs and cats will experience some type of tumor or nodule in the skin or in the subcutaneous tissue just under the skin. These bumps or lumps can be very concerning to the pet owner as they may be maligprocess after the biopsy is taken.

The biopsy samples taken are often small, and the report may come back as inconclusive. This is not what you want to hear after putting your pet through the biopsy procedure. All these choices have consequences for both owners and out cancer of subcutaneous and dermal masses quickly and within the clinic setting. Early diagnosis is the most important step in cancer treatment and improves the patient's prognosis. The HT Vista device can be used with any cutaneous mass that can be palpated. However, masses that are raw or bleeding are not suitable for scanning with

the tissue to see how it reacts. Because malignant tissue reacts differently than normal tissue to thermal stimulation, the device uses an algorithm and interprets the heat diffusion in selected adjacent areas.

The whole process takes one minute with results returned within minutes, and is supposed to be ninety-eight percent accurate. The HT Vista reads the signal and sends the data to a cloud-based database. Artificial intelligence analyzes the data and compares the new data with an existing database to give an accurate classification of whether the lesion is benign or malignant. At that time, a decision can be made regarding the need for a biopsy and whether to take narrow or wide margins.

Normal and abnormal tissues transfer heat differently due to their difference in metabolism tissue morphology and heat capacity. Results are presented using a numerical 1 to 10 scale. A reading of 1 to 4 means further investigation is needed, such as a biopsy, another scan, or scraping and cytology. A reading of 5 to 10 on the scale means the mass appears to be benign, with a 98 percent certainty.

Progress in veterinary medicine is going at a fast pace. Computers and other sophisticated devices coming on the market benefit our furry friends and make their lives longer and more comfortable.



nant. Most lesions cannot be identified as cancerous with just a visual inspection, so a biopsy or surgical removal is necessary. A histopathology is needed to see if the lesion is benign or malignant. Some skin lesions can be in a very difficult location, and the surgeon needs to know whether to take a narrow or wide sample for biopsy. The location can affect the cost of the procedure as well as the ability to suture the area, and can also put a strain on the patient by creating a painful healing

pets. For the pet, an unnecessarily wide incision can mean potential injury to surrounding tissue and nerves and delayed healing time. For the owner, it may mean higher costs for the procedure.

Wouldn't it be nice if we could tell whether a lesion is benign or malignant before we do a biopsy or surgery? Well, there is now a device called the HT Vista from a company in Israel. HT Vista is the first noninvasive medical device that allows veterinarians to rule this device, and it cannot be used on lymph nodes or any internal organ.

How does this machine work? The machine must be turned on with an internet connection. An area under examination on the patient is clipped with a surgical blade along with an area involving normal tissue. The HT Vista device is placed over the lump and over some of the normal tissue next to it. The tissue over the lesion is heated for a few seconds. The device then scans




My second place winner 66, was # Jabir Coupd'E'Tat Doja Kat. She had a beautiful head and eye, good muscle tone and a very good mover!

The Fault That May Come Back to Bite Us!

cerning.

he Afghan Hound is first and fore most a hunting hound. He must be capable of running down and killing large, often powerful game. For the King of Dogs to function in this way, his dentition and strength of jaw are of paramount importance. Recently, I have had reports from multiple, well-respected breederjudges indicating an increasing number of faulty bites being seen in the ring. That a number of these faults

First let us remember what the official AKC breed standard has to say about this:

were seen on finished champions is especially con-

"...the underjaw showing great strength, the jaws long and punishing; the mouth level, meaning that the teeth from the upper jaw and lower jaw meet evenly, neither overshot nor undershot. This is a difficult mouth to breed. A scissors bite is even more punishing and can be bred more easily into a dog than a level mouth, and a dog having a scissors bite, where the lower teeth slip inside and rest against the teeth of the upper jaw should not be punished."

Most Afghan Hounds seen today possess a scissors bite. This bite is very functional, and as the standard says, scissors bites are relatively easy to breed true, minimizing but not eliminating the chance of breeding faulty mouths. When I was first starting in the breed, my earliest mentor, Carl Sanders (Zebec Afghans), was a proponent of level bites. He felt that dogs with level bites were more likely to have a strong underjaw. In my opinion, this appearance of stronger underjaw is an illusion, created by the fact

that jaws with a level bite do not close as tightly as they do with a scissors bite. What I learned from observing these level bites is that there is a strong tendency for one or more incisors to "pop" out of line. While popped teeth represent more of a cosmetic flaw than an actual bad bite, it is still not a desirable trait. I have also found that in a level bite, the teeth tend to wear down more with age, leading to increased dental care needs in aging dogs. As a breeder, my preference is for the scissors bite, but when I judge, scissors and level are judged equally. It is worth noting that the British and FCI standard calls for a scissors bite, with level "tolerated".

A more serious problem is the tendency for some of these once level bites to go undershot by the time the dog reaches maturity. An undershot bite is one in which the lower teeth are placed forward of the upper teeth. This is clearly described as a fault. Also faulty is the overshot bite, where the upper teeth are too far forward so that the lower teeth cannot rest against them as in a scissors bite.

Another fault we sometimes see in the breed is the wry mouth. This is a type of malocclusion that typically occurs when one quadrant of the jaw grows too long or short compared to the others. Normally a wry mouth can be observed when checking the bite

as some incisors will meet their opposing upper or lower tooth, but others will not. This is the bite fault I have observed most often in judging.

While not common, I have also observed crowding of the incisors on heads that were extremely narrow. The jaw must have enough breadth to allow the teeth to fit in a normal manner! Base narrow canines are also possible with long, narrow heads. This occurs when the lower canine teeth emerge at a straight upward angle rather than tipping outward. This can cause a painful situation where these canine teeth may contact the palette or upper gums, requiring some degree of orthodontic intervention for the comfort of the dog. While I have not observed this in Afghan Hounds, I am aware of several cases in Borzoi.

Our standard does not have any disqualifications and simply classifies deviations from a normally aligned level or scissors bite as faults. That said, I strongly encourage all breeders, exhibitors, and judges of the Afghan Hound to consider bite faults as they relate to the original purpose and function of the breed. An undershot, overshot, or wry mouth is less punishing and therefore diminishes the animal's ability to function as intended.

Also worth mentioning is the issue of missing teeth. Most commonly we see Afghan Hounds with missing premolars. Breeders should be aware that all dogs, regardless of breed, should have 42 teeth—20 upper, and 22 lower. The Afghan Hound standard does not address missing teeth, so judges, per AKC directive, are only to check the bite (front teeth). This

means the onus falls on breeders to pay attention to the importance of full dentition. While the standard may not explicitly fault missing teeth, a mouth full of holes will certainly be less punishing!

There was a time not long ago when a bad bite pretty much eliminated a dog as a show or breeding prospect. Those that were put in the ring anyway typically didn't get very far as there were far greater numbers and judges had plenty of alternatives in their rings. In today's reality we have fewer Afghan Hounds being shown. In some divisions it only takes four (the lowest point scale allowable) for a major. Therefore, some dogs finish today with relative ease when they would have struggled in the days of larger entries. This does not mean that we should become complacent about this and finish or breed these dogs just because we can.

As our numbers decrease, we must increase our resolve to keep the Afghan Hound true to tradition and most importantly to the standard. Breeders and exhibitors, please be honest with yourselves. Bite problems propagate all too easily and can take over our breed before you know it. Please think twice before you put these dogs in the ring or sell them to show homes as breeding prospects.

Judges, I implore you to consider how faults may hinder function and prioritize accordingly. When at all possible, please avoid awarding dentition that deviates from the standard. We must not allow faulty bites to become endemic in our breed. It will come back to bite us!







Yes, I know the challenges of owning an Afghan Hound who has a mind of their own; they are being as selective as you and I.
